By working together, these stakeholders ensure students develop a strong foundation of values, ultimately contributing to their well-being. a study on Teacher's views on Value Education -A qualitative study in Sweden and Turkey" aimed to explore the perspectives of Swedish and Turkish teachers regarding values education. Qualitative interviews were conducted with 52 teachers from both countries and analyzed to gain insights into their views on this topic. The findings revealed that values education primarily focused on instilling conformity with societal values and norms. The learning objectives emphasized how to interact with others and take selfresponsibility. Notably, the teachers did not adopt a critical approach to values education. A common method reported by the teachers for values education was to serve as positive role models during daily interactions with students. Values education was depicted as an inherent aspect of social interactions, deeply embedded in everyday practices. Furthermore, the language used by the teachers to discuss values and values education was everyday and accessible. However, there was a notable lack of professional knowledge in this area among the teachers. The study highlighted the importance of values education in fostering desirable behaviors among students but also underscored the need for further professional development and critical reflection among teachers in this domain.

D. Estimation of the in build values within the secondary students: A qualitative study ("Teacher's views on Value Education") explored Swedish and Turkish teachers' perspectives. Interviews with 52 teachers found a focus on conformity to societal norms, with an emphasis on social interaction and self-responsibility. Teachers primarily acted as role models, integrating values education into daily interactions. While everyday language facilitated communication, a lack of professional knowledge was evident. The study highlights the importance of fostering desired behaviors through values education, but emphasizes the need for teacher development and critical reflection. This perspective argues for integrating values education directly into mainstream schools, focusing on the unique role of teachers. It acknowledges the changing landscape of education, where teachers play a critical role in fostering positive change. A qualitative study explored teachers' views on lost values. Interviewing participants, the research identified honesty, understanding, and respect as eroding values. Teachers blamed social media and family changes. To revive these values, they advocated for values education courses and school-family collaboration.

The overall theories and experimentation critically judged and impartially reviewed. Mostly these studies highlighted the moral and ideal picture of value education in classroom education system but reality is far away. The intentions of policy makers and the views of educators clashed. This gap was caused by the teachers' insufficient grasp of the idea of "values in education," which was made worse by their lack of reflection on this issue, being unable to address the effects of their opinions as teachers on values in education, their need for appropriate training, their lack of understanding of the hidden curriculum and how they approached real-world problems involving values in education, in addition to their unwillingness to implement varying strategies to encourage values in education. The primary finding is that, in certain schools, the application of values in education wasn't significantly influenced by education programs to far.
